THE COURSE

This course examines anthropological approaches for understanding health and medicine in society and culture. A wide range and distribution of health-related experience, discourse, knowledge, and practice among different societies and among different social strata within various societies are considered. The course assumes that human health is simultaneously a physical and symbolic artifact, socially produced, culturally specific, and anchored in a particular historical moment.
